

Things to consider before adoption

- 1) Is everyone in your family ready for a new pet?
 - We recommend that everyone in the household is in agreement and young children are introduced slowly to any animal.
- 2) If you are not the homeowner, do you have permission from the homeowner to bring a pet into the home?
- 3) If you are renting an apartment or house, do you have your landlord's permission to add a pet to the home?
 - We recommend verifying pet policies with your apartment complex or landlord prior to adoption.
- 4) Are you aware of any breed, size or quantity restrictions in your area?
 - We have seen people fall in love with an animal and get it home only to find out that they are not allowed to have the animal due to a restriction. Please ask our adoption counselors if you are unsure of any restrictions that may exist.
- 5) Are your existing pets spayed or neutered?
 - We recommend that all healthy pets are altered by **four months** of age to prevent unwanted pregnancies, certain behavior issues and potential health problems.
- 6) Are your existing pets up to date on vaccines such as rabies and distemper/parvo?
 - We recommend that you introduce a new pet to other pets that are fully vaccinated.
- 7) Do your existing pets get along well with other animals?
 - You can request a "dog meet" at the shelter to see how each animal reacts. Also ask us for more information about pet introductions.
- 8) Are your existing pets up to date on preventative medicine for heartworms, fleas and ticks?
 - Mosquitos, fleas and ticks are prevalent in the South. We recommend that your pets are given monthly heartworm, flea and tick preventatives. Ask us about the options.

- 9) Are you ready for the financial responsibility of owning a dog or cat?
 - The annual cost of owning a pet is estimated between \$750 and \$1,500 for food, vet care, grooming, training, boarding, toys and treats. Vet care expenses often start in the first week of owning your pet.
- 10) If you are adopting a dog, do you have a fenced in yard?
 - We recommend, and it is the law in Knoxville and Knox County, that you have a way to contain your dog, other than chaining or tethering. If you do not have a fence, we recommend that the dog is taken outside for exercise and bathroom breaks at least four times a day. Puppies require even more trips outside for housetraining.
- 11) Are you adopting this pet as a "gift" for someone else?
 - We recommend that the potential pet owner meet the animal before adoption. We often see people realize what type of pet they are really looking for when they handle the animal themselves.
- 12) Are you adopting a sponsored animal or an animal with special needs?
 - We recommend that every adopter take their time with the adoption process. Having a pet is a big responsibility and can be up to a 20 year commitment. Please ask us for more information that will help you make this life saving decision ©
